P.R.I.D.E Positive Racial Identity Development in Early Childhood Education is a multi-component early education program designed to support positive racial identity development in young Black children (birth through 8) by educating and training the important adults in their lives. Young Audiences Arts for Learning (Young Audiences), the nation's largest arts in education learning network, has been awarded a \$9.2 million federal grant through the US Department of Education's (DOE) Assistance for Arts Education (AAE) program. The project, Responsive Arts in School Education (RAISE), will bring Teaching Artists (TAs), School

Social Workers (SSWs), and classroom teachers into a partnership to develop healing-centered and culturally responsive-sustaining arts in education residency programs to enhance student learning and well-being across the country. Sister IAsia was trained in Social Emotional Learning with the first cohort and returned in 2023 as a lead teaching artist to support the learning of the second cohort members.

Pittsburgh Cultural Treasures Initiative Evaluation Sub-Committee 2023

As a cultural treasure, Sister IAsia Thomas was selected to participate in an advisory sub-group charged with reviewing evaluation submissions, interviewing firms, offering analysis and critique of the efficacy of each group, and participating in subgroup meetings toward selecting an evaluation firm for the Cultural Treasures Initiative.

Shifting Power Fellow

2022

Sister IAsia presented a collaborative body of autoethnographic research that centered on Black and African adult and student identities (*Witness: The Reframe of Educational Equity, The Case for Afrocentric Education* in terms of culture, gender, immigration, ethnicity, and power, as well as what it means to value epistemic diversity. Her work reflected the diversity that exists with Blackness and Black pedagogy. This work is part of a co-authored scholarly paper published in October 2022.

AEC recognizes that culturally responsive arts education (CRAE) is among the most powerful tools educators can leverage to transform education systems, ensure that every student receives high-quality arts education, and calls on experts in the field to evolve and strengthen its efficacy and influence.
